

Fighting the INVacCers

A creepy winter vine

Of course, it's wintercreeper – Euonymous *fortuneii,* a vine with leaves that stay green well into December or beyond if the weather is mild.

Wintercreeper is one of the tougher invasives that the stewardship crew deals with. Brought over from Asia as an ornamental ground cover, this aggressive, shade-tolerant vine forms dense mats across the ground and climbs up trees and other objects, where it branches out horizontally several feet and produces flowers and seeds.

Wintercreeper vines can be 6 inches in diameter and can grow 50 feet or more up trees by attaching themselves with aerial roots that grow into the bark of the trees and are difficult to remove without damaging the bark of the tree. We've also noticed dense growths of wintercreeper at the base of large trees creating a moist microclimate that keeps the tree bark wet. This densely matted groundcover severely limits the regeneration of native woodland plants.

We find it more frequently in natural areas close to urban areas where many homeowners still use wintercreeper as a groundcover. Birds eat the seeds of wintercreeper and are probably the main source of spreading it into natural areas. Prescribed fire burns can top kill wintercreeper, but herbicides are usually required to control large infestations.





Pulling wintercreeper

Small mats of wintercreeper can be removed by hand. Start at the edge and pull the vines gently and slowly so the roots are pulled up with the vine. You can roll up the vines as you work, ending with a large ball of vines that should be sealed in a bag and thrown away or solarized to thoroughly kill the vegetation before composting. Do not leave the pulled vines in contact with the ground; they will re-root and start growing again.

Stewardship Update

The Tuesday work crew continues ongoing efforts at Gudmundson Wildlife Sanctuary (GWS), removing invasive species, tearing down old fences, and maintaining trails.

While working on a trail that parallels the bluff over the Sangamon River, sugar maples growing along the edge of the trail were being removed. As the crew was taking out the maples, they were surprised to discover many large red oaks along with some smaller white oaks, bur oaks, and shagbark hickories behind the wall of maples. The maples were so thick you could not see the trunks of these large oaks, and looking up into the canopy all you could see were maple leaves.

Fast-growing, shade-tolerant sugar maples out-compete oak trees, so the crew has been removing the sugar maples amongst these oaks to promote the growth of healthy oaks and to increase understory herbaceous plants. The big red oaks are at a point where a few of them will need to be thinned out too, but having too many oaks is a much better problem to have than not having enough.










Left column: A northern red oak and the northern red oak's leaves in autumn.

Updates

FOSV lands pollinator grant

Friends of the Sangamon Valley's application for the Soil and Water Conservation District's Pollinator Planting has been approved! This fall we will be converting eight acres of pasture to pollinator plots. This program will cover 75% of the cost of the project. Illinois native plants will be established to provide nectar sources and larval host plants.
